## 'Another super village event'



'Amazing to have so much talent in one village'

The Third Exhibition of the Artists of Cublington at the Biggs Pavilion has been a great success. Nearly 200 people visited the show throughout the weekend and were able to view a variety of work by 15 artists. Some exhibited works were for sale and many were purchased.

A big thank you to all the helpers and to the numerous people who made cakes. An enormous amount of cake was consumed throughout the weekend and thank you to everyone who made generous financial donations.









I was surprised to be asked to write this review as my knowledge of art is not a thing I would put near the top of a resume. But then I thought about the expression, beauty is in the eye of the beholder. And a view from a non-arty person may just be the ticket and certainly less analytical!

I never got to previous shows, so I was amazed at the standard and diversity of the work on display. After all, it's not like we are a big village with thousands of residents, so how we managed to find so much talent surely makes a mockery of the ratio of artists to resident percentages (if there is such a thing).

As I entered the hall, I could tell that this wasn't a show just about individual artists from the village but much more of a collective effort. The hall was well laid out, the displays professionally mounted, and all the artwork was displayed at a height that seemed to work for all. As I wandered around it became very clear, very quickly, that a great deal of time, effort and love had been poured into the work and wow, such variety. From portraits (a particularly good Mr Brandon kept his eyes on me as I went past), landscapes, sculptures, photography, tapestry, pottery, cyanotypes (using light reactive paper), jewellery, felting, stained glassing (I did say I wasn't an expert) and loads of fabulous paintings in many different mediums depicting just about anything you can think of. Speaking to one of the artists, he told me that one of his pieces had taken nearly a year to complete, which got me thinking about all the other artists and how much collective time must have been spent to put this show together.

I spoke with many of the exhibitors, and all of them exuded the same quiet modesty, as though their incredible talents were nothing out of the ordinary. Well, all I can say is thank-you, for what was an amazing display of art showing that the village of Cublington has a deep well of hidden talents. And who knows, maybe there is more out there waiting to be discovered?

Finally, these shows don't just happen, they need support. The cakes didn't bake themselves, there was always someone on duty with a helping hand throughout the opening hours. The marketing of the event needed to be organised and probably loads of other things I haven't even thought of. After all, I was always told that a thing well done is worth doing and I know you all done good!!!!

#### Upcycled fox

This fantastic fox is made from a cardboard toilet roll tube and two cupcake cases – simply add beads or googly eyes to bring him to life.

#### Takes 30 mins plus drying time

You will need

- newspaper
- orange paint
- paintbrushes
- toilet roll tube
- 2 white cupcake cases
- 3 black beads
- glue

#### What to do

- 1. Lay down newspaper to protect the work surface. Paint the toilet roll tube orange and leave to dry.
- 2. Open both cupcake cases out flat, fold both in half, then a quarter and then in half again. To make the face, open one of the cases back out so that it is in a quarter-fold with a crease down the middle. Glue the inside folded quarters flat together. To make the tail, glue the second case together so you have a thinner cone shape.
- 3. Paint the two folded cupcake cases orange, leaving the tips unpainted for the tail and nose. Leave to dry, then turn over and paint the undersides. Leave to dry.
- 4. Once the body is dry, create the ears by pressing the top front and the top back of the tube in towards the centre.
- 5. Glue two beads onto the face for eyes and another for the nose. Stick the fox's face to its body and glue the tail in place at the back, pointy side out.

## Orchard Ground & Morth Field

## LATEST NEWS and UPDATES



#### **Orchard Ground**

It was reported in the September edition of The Crier that Cublington had been awarded the Dashwood Trophy for the best runner-up in the Buckinghamshire Best Kept Village Competition. It has transpires that Cublington is to be awarded another trophy for outdoor recreation facilities, designated nature conservation, and community involvement particularly with the community orchard and North Field, scoring maximum points in the two categories for these headings. Another 'feather in the cap' for Cublington and an acknowledgement of the volunteering that has gone into these the upkeep and development of these assets for residents of the local community. More details soon.

#### North Field

A number of 'North Field Hero' awards have recently been made to 29 volunteers who have helped out over the past 20 months since planning permission was granted. Volunteers have helped in the early days marking out the orchard and planting 65 fruit and nut trees; planting 2,500 tree whips into woodland and copse areas and 500 hedging whips provided by the Woodland Trust and Conservation Volunteers to create a new hedge line and to help restore exiting hedging; planting out the blossom circle with crab apple, hawthorn and flowering cherry to which snowdrops and bluebells have been added; planning and maintaining the footpaths with regular mowing; marking out and planting the first meadow area, and also undertaking various maintenance tasks around the orchard and blossom circle, and in the copse and woodland areas with several volunteers learning how to use a scythe. It is quite amazing what these Cublington volunteers have achieved in just 20 months. In addition, another 50 volunteers have helped with community planting events, most recently with the 7 Red Oak trees and 9 Scotts Pine trees which were planted to commemorate the life and reign of the late Queen Elizabeth II.

Volunteering for the North Field is very flexible, recognising that people have other commitments.

Whilst most of work happens on Saturday mornings, other volunteering happens at other times too. The work parties on Saturdays run from 9.30am to 12.00 midday and finish with tea/coffee and bacon rolls. Please feel free to drop in on any of the dates below to have a chat to any of the volunteers, or joining in on one of the planting days. This volunteering has a social dynamic and is a great way of meeting new people and catching up with friends.

#### **Working Groups**

The past few weeks has see the work teams on North Field cutting out dock plants and the ragwort. Thank you to those who have 'flagged' the ragwort and reported the whereabouts of this invasive plant.

## HARVEST FESTIVAL

#### Origins, facts and customs

The Harvest Festival is a long-standing tradition and celebrates a successful yield for farmers across the country. Today, it focuses on charitable giving, specifically sharing food with those who do not have access to basic provisions.

In Britain, thanks have been given for successful harvests since pagan times. Harvest festival is traditionally held on the Sunday near or of the Harvest Moon. This is the full Moon that occurs closest to the autumn equinox. The celebrations on this day usually include singing hymns, praying, and decorating churches with baskets of fruit and food in the festival known as Harvest Festival, Harvest Home, Harvest Thanksgiving or Harvest Festival of Thanksgiving.

The Harvest Festival tradition pre-dates Christianity and dates back to the pagan times and the name derives from the Old English word 'Haerfest' meaning 'Autumn'. Today's church celebrations only began in earnest in Victorian times, when the Reverend Robert Stephen Hawker invited his parishioners to a special harvest thanksgiving service at the church in Morwenstow, Cornwall in 1843.

#### Customs and traditions:

An early harvest festival used to be celebrated at the beginning of the harvest season on 1 August and was called Lammas, meaning 'loaf Mass'. The Latin prayer to hallow the bread is given in the Durham Ritual. Farmers made loaves of bread from the fresh wheat crop. These were given to the local church as the Communion bread during a special service thanking God for the harvest.

Nowadays the festival is held at the end of harvest, which varies in different parts of Britain. Sometimes neighbouring churches will set the Harvest Festival on different Sundays so that people can attend each other's thanksgivings.

Until the 20th century most farmers celebrated the end of the harvest with a big meal called the harvest supper, to which all who had helped in the harvest were invited. It was sometimes known as a "Mell-supper", after the last patch of corn or wheat standing in the fields which was known as the "Mell" or "Neck". Cutting it signified the end of the work of harvest and the beginning of the feast. There seems to have been a feeling that it was bad luck to be the person to cut the last stand of corn. The farmer and his workers would race against the harvesters on other farms to be first to complete the harvest, shouting to announce they had finished. In some counties the last stand of corn would be cut by the workers throwing their sickles at it until it was all down, in others the reapers would take it in turns to be blindfolded and sweep a scythe until all of the Mell was cut down.

Corn dolls are also traditionally made for the Harvest Festival using the last sheath of the harvest. This doll is then kept until spring to ensure a good crop the following year. This doll is then sacrificed with a hare (one hiding in the crop). The doll is meant to symbolise the goddess of the grain. Nowadays a hare made of straw is sacrificed instead.

Some churches and villages still have a Harvest Supper. The modern British tradition of celebrating Harvest Festival in churches began in 1843, when the Reverend Robert Hawker invited parishioners to a special thanksgiving service at his church at Morwenstow in Cornwall. Victorian hymns such as We plough the fields and scatter, Come, ye thankful people, come and All things bright and beautiful but also Dutch and German harvest hymns in translation helped popularise his idea of harvest festival, and spread the annual custom of decorating churches with home-grown produce for the Harvest Festival service. On 8 September 1854 the Revd Dr William Beal, Rector

of Brooke, Norfolk, [2] held a Harvest Festival aimed at ending what he saw as disgraceful scenes at the end of harvest, and went on to promote 'harvest homes' in other Norfolk villages. Another early adopter of the custom as an organised part of the Church of England calendar was Rev Piers Claughton at Elton, Huntingdonshire in or about 1854.

As British people have come to rely less heavily on home-grown produce, there has been a shift in emphasis in many Harvest Festival celebrations. Increasingly, churches have linked Harvest with an awareness of and concern for people in need of basic provisions and for whom growing crops of sufficient quality and quantity remains a struggle. Development and Relief organisations often produce resources for use in churches at harvest time which promote their own concerns for those in need across the globe.

Encyclopaedia Britannica traces the origins to "the animistic belief in the corn [grain] spirit or corn mother." In some regions the farmers believed that a spirit resided in the last sheaf of grain to be harvested. To chase out the spirit, they beat the grain to the ground. Elsewhere they wove some blades of the cereal into a "corn dolly" that they kept safe for "luck" until seed-sowing the following year. Then they ploughed the ears of grain back into the soil in hopes that this would bless the new crop. In the early days, there were ceremonies and rituals at the beginning as well as at the end of the harvest:



### Seasonal Recipe

## Lentil-stuffed roast squash

Note: for this one, you don't have to use a butternut squash specifically. This also

works well with other types of squash, including pumpkins - just make sure you adjust the cooking times for the size of the veg!



- 75g lentils (either green or red, uncooked)
- 1 medium butternut squash, halved lengthways and flesh scooped out (preferably homegrown!)
- 1 litre stock (ensure this is correct for your kind of lentil)
- 1 onion, diced
- 1 sprig fresh rosemary
- Juice of ½ a lemon
- ½ a courgette, diced
- 2 garlic cloves
- 4-5 sundried tomatoes, diced
- Salt and pepper
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 1 bay leaf
- 50g peas (homegrown is best, otherwise frozen is good)
- A few leaves of fresh sage
- Feta cheese (for garnish, optional)

#### Method:

- 1. Preheat your oven to 200°C and place your halved, scooped out squash on a parchment-lined sheet, cut face down. Bake this for 55-60 minutes.
- 2. In the meantime, prepare the filling. Saute the onions and garlic in a saucepan with about the olive oil until soft and fragrant. Add the courgette and sundried tomatoes and cook on a medium heat until the courgette has softened a little.
- 3. Add all the other ingredients except for the peas and lemon juice and place a lid on the pan. Leave to simmer for as long as your lentils require to cook (12 minutes for red, 40 minutes for green). If there is still a lot of liquid remaining, simmer for a while with the lid off to reduce.
- 4. When the filling is ready, add the peas in and stir through, cooking for a further 5 minutes, and pick out the rosemary and sage. Then take it from the heat and set aside.
- 5. After the baking is complete, take the squash out of the oven. Careful it will be hot! You can check to make sure it's cooked through by turning it over and piercing with a fork it should go through the skin easily. Turn it back over and scoop out some of the soft flesh leaving about a half inch border around near the skin.
- 6. Mix the scooped squash into your lentil mix and spoon it back into the squash 'bowls' top with feta or any other cheese you fancy and it's ready to serve!

## From the Rector





#### The Great Harvest

It's the time of the year when many churches are celebrating harvest festival, an occasion to remember two things: the harvesting of the earth that we undertake (along with its relation to questions of supply, need, distribution and social justice), and the harvesting that we ourselves don't do because only God can. The harvesting of the earth under God's direction is a theme we find in the Book of Revelation, the last book in the Bible. Coincidentally this is a book that one of the discussion groups in our benefice is currently studying in some detail.

It is a style of literature that makes use of particular forms of imagery and symbolism (some of which requires a bit of unpacking) both to inspire and to challenge. The Book of Revelation combines images and scenes of awesome promise and inspiration along with others that are, to put it mildly, very challenging. It addresses the tension between God's sovereign rule and the presence of evil and looks towards a resolution of history, aiming to unveil the truth from a position not dominated by certain worldviews and powers of the time in question.

It proceeds to make a connection to the concept of harvest, the drawing or gathering in that God alone can ultimately do, certain aspects of which we may not even yet see – at best we see them 'partially', as St Paul says in one of his letters. One thing that becomes clear on reading the Book of Revelation one chapter after another, without decomposing it into isolated extracts, is that the 'seeing' in question is manifold. Reorientation is needed for greater clarity of vision. The people who would originally have received the text of the Book of Revelation were communities who would have recognized the significance of the imagery used and many of the historical figures and tensions of their day to which the seer was pointing. Our discussion group has been thinking about the relation of the text to the situations and tensions we find in today's world, because the theme of harvest, both that which is achievable by us and that which God alone can effect, remains as relevant now as it did back then. That ongoing relevance may be seen as an invitation to be received and explored in communities wanting to seek truth and orientation towards God's call on humanity, while being realistic about our human condition, our partiality and our capacity to do things that may hinder a harvest, both literally and metaphorically.

With prayers for our communities, the world and the harvest

#### Autumn Crafts for Children

#### Pinecone mouse

These mice are easy enough for even the littlest hands to make – help them cut the ears and feet from felt, then let them glue everything in place.

- pinecone
- light brown felt
- small square of card
- glue
- scissors
- small pink pom-pom






