Use it or lose it. A phrase which can be used on many occasions. Sometimes we can perhaps actually make a difference by 'using it', but unfortunately there will be other occasions when there is nothing we can or should do.

Our wonderful pub is one of the 'use it's' that could make a difference. It is very sad to see both the Royal Oak in Aston Abbotts and the Queens Head in Wing close down in the last few years. In fact Aston Abbotts used to boast two pubs, but the Bull and Butcher closed down years ago. With great enjoyment we therefore try to support the Unicorn - perhaps a bit too much on some occasions!

However there are so many other 'use it or lose it' opportunities. For example the local bus is often empty. Supermarkets try to get you to use self-service tills, rather than actually employing people to serve you, so go to a cashier. Cash - we took our family to Paradise Wildlife Park a week ago and tried to buy ice-creams for all. The card machine had stopped working and they were turning people away. I had cash, so thought we would be Ok to buy ice-creams without the use of the card machine, but we were told they don't accept cash. This, I believe, is becoming more and more common. Unfortunately I don't think much can be done about the cash issue though.

The other main 'use it or lose it' could well be your fitness. It is widely known that exercise is good for us all. There are a number of options within the village, such as North Field which is great to walk around, Tai Chi, tennis courts, cricket and table tennis. I started playing tennis just a couple of years ago and really enjoy it. We try to play with friends once a week and also take part in the Friday evening coaching. I also went out horse riding this week on a proper hack, including cantering. This was the first time in a number of years and as of today, 3 days later, still have muscles which I can feel have had to work harder than normal. However I consider myself reasonably fit as we try to join the brisk walkers on a Friday morning and until recently when we very sadly lost both of our dogs, had to walk them twice a day. I recently had a 'big' birthday (no not 70!) and am feeling it takes more effort to do some things. However I will continue to play tennis as much as possible (then go to the pub for a refreshing drink), perhaps walk along the canal (with a pub lunch), walk with the brisk walkers (then a pub lunch) - can you see the theme here - I am keeping myself fit together with supporting local hostelries and will hopefully continue to do so for many years to come.

So hope you all try to 'use it or lose it' in whichever way you can.



Orchard Ground

Progress has been made for Orchard Ground to become a registered charity. The land for Orchard Ground and North Field were bequeathed to the Cublington Parish Council by Alice Biggs in 1991. Charitable status will help to further protect this important asset for our community and open up other possible grant funding opportunities. Cublington Parish Council will remain as the owners of Orchard Ground and North Field acting as a landlord with a revolving lease to Cublington Orchard Ground the name of the proposed charity. Cublington Tennis Club, Cublington Tennis Club and the village allotments who are all based on Orchard Ground will continue to function as they do now and will have protected status within the lease.

'Jewel in the Crown'

Both Orchard Ground and North Field scored highly in the recent 'Best Kept Village' competition where Cublington was awarded second place. Comments were made as to the tidiness of Orchard Ground and the community orchard areas on North Field testimony to the work of the teams of volunteers who work on the upkeep on the tennis courts, cricket field, allotments and the community areas.

Bob Paine and Martyn Waters recently met with the CVEO of The Clare Foundation to explore the possibilities of a grant from this charitable trust. He described Orchard Ground and North Field as a 'jewel in the crown' for the village of Cublington asking how a village of just 375 people can have such an amazing community asset, testimony to the efforts of the volunteers linked to the various clubs and interest groups based at Orchard Ground.

North Field

The working group have been busy over the summer months trimming around the orchard trees, cutting back some areas of tall grasses especially in the meadow areas, removing dock plants from around the field, trimming the footpaths and checking tree stakes and deer netting. Further such work will take place in September and October preparing for the next planting season which will start in November. People walking North Field will have seen several people using scythes to cut the grass around the orchard which has helped

to speed up the process especially with the wet summer and the speed at which the grass has been growing. Conservation Volunteers have offered North Field 300 tree whips including hedging whips, these will be delivered in early November. The North Field group are exploring the possibilities of some storage on North Field for equipment which is currently stored in various garages in the village. Also possible funding from The Tree Council for a number of more mature trees which will complete the blossom circle. A Tree Council paid for the red oaks and Scotts pines which were planted on North Field earlier this year.

Carrot and Parsnip Cake

4 eggs

200g brown sugar 100g caster sugar 250ml vegetable oil

1 tsp vanilla extract 2 tsp cinnamon

1 tsp dried ginger

1 tsp nutmeg
½ tsp cardamom
350g plain flour

2 tsp baking powder Pinch of salt

250g carrot, grated 125g parsnip, grated 100g pecans

+ a few to garnish

Cream Cheese Icing

200g pure icing sugar 100g unsalted butter 250g cream cheese Zest/juice of one lemon 1 tsp vanilla extract Preheat oven to 180 degrees Celsius and grease and line a 24cm cake tin. Peel and grate carrots and parsnip, set aside.

Using electric beaters or a stand mixer, beat together eggs and sugars until light and pale – this will take about 5-7 minutes. Stream in olive oil, beating to combine. Add vanilla and all spices and beat to combine. Sift in flour, baking powder and salt and then fold together until just combined, do no overwork. Fold in carrots, parsnip and nuts and pour into the prepared cake tin.

Bake for about an hour and ten minutes, turning it halfway. It may take a bit longer to cook depending on your oven but keep an eye on it. As soon as a skewer comes out clean, you're good to go. Let the cake cool completely before assembling.

Cream Cheese Icing

With electric beaters, beat your room temperature butter until soft and smooth. Add in your room temperature cream cheese and beat until smooth; there should be no more clumps of butter or cream cheese, super smooth.

Sift icing sugar into a separate bowl, and add to the mixer one tablespoon at a time, beating well between each addition. After you first add a spoon of sugar, beat on the lowest speed until just combined, then turn up to medium/high for a couple of minutes before adding the next scoop of sugar. Continue beating until all sugar is incorporated and it feels completely smooth when rubbed between two fingers. Add lemon zest, juice and vanilla and beat to combine.

Spread liberally on top and scatter with leftover nuts.




This is a non wetsuit swim. The sea temperature will be around 16 degrees.

1. Apologies

None

2. Minutes of last meeting

The minutes of the last meeting held on 9th May 2023 were discussed by the meeting and duly signed by the Chair.

3. Declaration of Interest

Cllr Antosiewicz declared an interest concerning agenda item 7.3.

4. Reports

Bucks Council Councillors

The meeting went through the points requiring assistance from our county councillors.

- The claim with Bucks Council concerning the gate and fence at Orchard Ground. The councillors will take this up with Steve Broadbent who is the Cabinet Member Bucks Council responsible for Transport.
- It was felt the quality of resurfacing of the Stewkley Road was poor. The councillors explained rural roads do not have edgings, and this road resurfacing was experimental as it was made up of recycled material from replacement

- surface. It was a mystery why the resurfacing was not started at the crossroads rather than the village gates. This will be taken up with the LAT managers and the urgency to repair the potholes between the village gates and the crossroads.
- 3. A pothole was repaired outside Orchard Ground entrance. It was the size of a laptop computer whilst there were numerous potholes at the entrance to Silver Street ignored. This will be taken up with LAT managers. It was explained to the councillors that these potholes were getting worse and the lorries going to the Red Brick Recycling Centre at 6.15am created a lot of noise when the lorries are empty. It is causing a lot of disturbance for residents.
- 4. Repair work should have been completed on Church Path. This was first raised in July 2022.Councillors will raise with LAT managers.
- 5. The kerb posts have been taken out near New Dairy Farm to stop the encroachment of council land. However, this will cause an issue when Doherty lorries start parking again on this verge waiting for the Red Brick Recycling Centre to open at 7.00am. The Enforcement Officers do not seem interested in doing anything about this problem. It was put to the councillors that BC should consider building laybys for the lorries or the site should open early to allow the lorries to be off the roads/verges. Lorries are still coming through the village just after 6.00am. It was suggested the enforcement officer should ask to look at the tacho records of these vehicles It was pointed out this matter is outside of our authority as it sits within Stewkley parish. The councillors will speak to Cllr Gomm about the matter.
- Roadworks near Acorn Farm took over a week. Why did this work take so long? It is highly probable this work was conducted by a utility company which the Council has

little control over as to when road closures and/or traffic control is conducted

Lockharts

The appeal on the planning application was upheld by the Inspectorate with an award of costs to the applicant. We must monitor the site to ensure the conditions of planning are adhered to. Lorries are parked on the site which move at times that are not allowed in the planning conditions. The storage of lorries is under the control of The Highways Commissioners rather than the Council. We should review the position to see if rules are being contravened.

5.2 To review the accounting statements to 30th June 2023

There was a surplus of £2,890 for the period to 30th June 2023 with closing cash balances of £24,594. The forecast to 31st March 2024 is a deficit of £6,010 and cash reserves of £15,693. There were committed costs of legal fees estimated at £2,500 and £7,500 for the replacement of street lighting mercury lamps to LED.

6. Orchard Ground/ North Field Report

A grant application has been made to FCC Community Action Fund (formally Wren) for solar panels in the name of CPC on behalf of Orchard Ground for £23,500. A decision from FCC will be made by the end of August.

A meeting was held with the CEO of the Clare Foundation, a charity which offers support to community organisations. The CEO was impressed with the facilities of OG and North Field and offered a grant of £10,000 towards the costs of a new footpath around North Field.

The Tree Council has offered OG to make another application for £2,000 of trees.

OG is looking at developing a website promoting all its facilities. Hemlock has been found near the allotments and has been taped off. It needs to be cut and the flowers taken off.

6.1 Draft Lease Considerations/New Charity

The clerk and Cllr Waters met with the lawyers to discuss the lease, and we are awaiting the final draft.

7. Planning Permissions

- **7.1 19/04435/ACL** Wing Caravan Site application for certificate of lawfulness for existing caravan site. The Inspectorate held an informal hearing last week awaiting decision on a complex case.
- 7.2 P0430/W/22/3300155 Lockharts Farm Waste Recycling Facility case referred to Inspectorate decided in favour of the applicant and awarded costs. Unfortunately, this means the recycling centre will start up again once the concrete wall has been rebuilt and improved.

8. Village Matters

8.1 Traffic

Cllr Shults reported Speedwatch sessions continue and reported stats as below .It was felt the speed of traffic through the village has reduced significantly as a result of Speedwatch. Cllr Shults and his team were thanked for their excellent work. The 30mph warning sign on Wing Road is not operating due to the overgrown hedges. Clerk to contact the owners.

8.2 Street Lighting

The LED replacement quotation was deficient in detail, so the contractor has been asked to come out and survey the existing lights to enable a comprehensive quotation.

8.3 Trees and lectern

The lectern has been installed and unveiled. A grant for the cost has been awarded by the Community Board. It was suggested lecterns should be installed in North Field setting out nature points of interest etc. It was noted there were hedges and trees that needed cutting throughout the village. The path from the Crossroads towards Chapel Alley was difficult to walk because of overgrown hedges. Mainly Mowing to be asked to cut back the hedges on the High Street. A complaint had been received concerning an overgrown garden in Silver Street. Clerk to contact the landlord of the property.

8.4 Playground Maintenance

The annual safety audit of the playground highlighted the need for the cableway to be dismantled and inspected. A quote for £600 from Wickstead for maintenance of the cableway has been received. The meeting approved this expenditure. A porthole is broken, and a replacement has been ordered. There were other minor deficiencies highlighted which will be looked at.

8.5 Waste Bins

The dog waste bin at the entrance to Orchard Ground is broken and a replacement has been ordered. The general waste bins locking system have

deteriorate over the years and Bucks Council has requested the bins are replaced with ones that have metal locks. Clerk to review.

The next meeting of the Parish Council and will take place on Tuesday 12th September 2023 7.30pm at Orchard Ground.






