



What is SpeedWatch?



Community SpeedWatch is an educational scheme to help people reduce speeding traffic through their community. The scheme enables volunteers to work within their community to raise awareness of the dangers of speeding and to help control the problem locally.

Community SpeedWatch incorporates poster campaigns and a pledge system linked to direct action using speed detection equipment all under the supervision of Thames Valley Police. The use of the radar device will not lead to prosecution – drivers will get a letter from the police instead – but will help to underline the community's commitment to reducing speed.

Since June 2022 a group of Cublington resident volunteers have been carrying out speed checks in 5 locations around the village, The Nob, outside the Old Rectory, outside of Cublington Growers, Aston Abbotts Road adjacent to the footpath and more recently outside Cublington Village Hall.

We firmly believe that speeding vehicles through the village has significantly decreased especially during the rush hour period and is evidenced by the reduction in numbers of offenders we are recording. Speeding at other times is still a problem but I believe we could reduce if we try to do some Speedwatch sessions later in the day. Below are some results from those sessions, So far, the volunteers have logged almost 200 hours of volunteering.

Orchard Ground & Morth Field

LATEST NEWS and UPDATES

North Field

It's now just over three years since the first orchard trees and first tree whips were planted on North Field. As the warmer (and drier!) spring weather arrives, I hope you will take the opportunity to walk around this community project on North Field to see what has been achieved in this short time, especially as more mature trees have now been planted which is helping to give the planted areas some shape. As this article is being written, the blossom is stating to show on the orchard trees and on trees in blossom circle. Tree planting has carried on through February with two purple beech trees, and four winter flowering cherries planted in a block over towards the Stewkley Road gate; these will give a spread of pink and white blossoms starting in December through to March. Maintenance work is continuing too with some pruning of the orchard trees and in the blossom circle to help to encourage some height. Volunteers have also been busy replacing a number of tree stakes, securing deer netting and spreading composted bark around the base of the trees. As the field dries out, maintenance work will include cutting the grass in the meadow area and around the orchard, and cutting the pathways. Dennis will be happy to help people to learn scything skills, although he did say that my first efforts to use a scythe looked as though I had cut the grass with a knife and fork! So room for improvement then in the spring.

Two new benches have been purchased for North Field following two generous donations. Thank you to Bridget Eadie for the donation to purchase a bench in memory of her mother and father. And to David and Freddie Bradbury whose donation to purchase a bench celebrates their recent diamond wedding anniversary. Once the weather dries up, both benches will the placed out on North Field after concrete bases have been laid to secure the benches.



FACTS ABOUT MOTHERS

is March 10th

- 1. Gaia, or Mother Earth, was the first goddess in Greek mythology. She created herself out of primordial chaos. She also created Earth and the universe.
- 2. The African Black Eagle typically will lay two eggs. After they hatch, the mother will just feed one of the chicks. The other chick is usually pecked to death by the other chick while the mother looks on.
- 3. The mother who gives birth to the largest baby on Earth is a mother elephant. After enduring 22 months of pregnancy, she gives birth to a blind, 200-pound calf.
- 4. A mother koala will feed her baby her own faeces. Baby koalas—or joeys—haven't developed the intestinal bacteria that help detoxify the highly poisonous eucalyptus leaves, which are a koala's main diet.
- 5. Polar bear moms put on around 400 pounds during their pregnancy. If the mother doesn't double her weight, her body will simply reabsorb the fetus.
- 6. A mother orangutan never puts her babies down and typically nurses them for 6 or 7 years, which is the longest mother/child nursing dependence of any animal on Earth.
- 7. One of the most famous mothers in literary history is Grendel's mother from Beowulf (A.D. 800–1100). While she is nameless, she attacks Beowulf's army to avenge the death of her son.
- 8. In developing countries, complications during pregnancy and childbirth are a leading cause of disability and death among women. Over 99% of maternal deaths occur in developing countries.
- 9. The youngest mother in recorded history is Lina Medina. She was just 5 years and 7 months old when she gave birth to a 6.5 lb. boy by caesarean section in Peru in 1939.
- 10. The oldest mother in modern history to give birth is Rajo Devi Lohan from India. She was 70 years old in 2008 when she gave birth to a baby girl following a controversial IVF treatment.
- 11. Bobbie McCaughey from Iowa gave birth to the most surviving children from a single birth. In 1997, she had the first surviving set of septuplets (4 boys and 3 girls).
- 12. The shortest interval between two births is 208 days, or 6½ months. Jayne Bleackley gave birth to a son on September 3, 1999. She later gave birth to a daughter on March 30, 2000
- 13. The mother with the most kids is Mrs. Feodor Vassilyev of Russia. She gave birth to 69 children between 1725 and 1765
- 14. The mother who gave birth to the heaviest baby was Carmelina Fedele of Italy in 1955. Her newborn weighed 22 pounds 8 oz.
- 15. While mother hamsters are cute and furry, they are infamous baby eaters. Indeed, first-time hamster moms may eat their babies if they feel threatened by them, if their babies are undersized or abnormal, or if they feel like they need extra nutrients after giving birth
- 16. During pregnancy, mothers and children exchange cells through their connection with the placenta. These cells can persist in the mother's body for years.
- 17. An early precedent of Mother's Day is the early Christian festival known as "Mothering Sunday," in which the faithful would return to their mother church. Eventually, the tradition became more secular, and children would present their mothers with gifts and flowers in appreciation.
- 18. Some of the worst mothers in movie history include Mrs. Robinson in The Graduate, Margaret White in Carrie, Joan Crawford in Mommie Dearest, Aunt Petunia in Harry Potter, the Queen Mother in Aliens, and Norma Bates in Psycho.

From the Rector



Easter

Lent began in February and, by now, Lent is well under way. The end of March sees us celebrating Easter Day.

The Sunday Gospel readings show that the Christmas baby has grown and the adult Christ has embarked on his ministry to any and to all who would listen. He has disturbed the powerful and given hope to the poor. He's also challenged those who believed they could clearly see and hear in faith that perhaps they couldn't; that they couldn't see, hear, understand, anything like as well as they thought. That's why there are various incidents where it was the physically blind and deaf who first recognise Christ and got the point of his ministry.

The Bible readings for Lent also make very clear the growing opposition to what Christ said and did. And it is Jesus' response to that opposition which helps us with the Easter story.

Why was the tomb empty? Why wasn't he there? because throughout his ministry and especially facing growing opposition, Jesus never remained where people thought he should be or where they tried to put him. He slipped through crowds; He negotiated a path through obtuse questioning; He was not in the tomb. The tomb was empty because Christ is not contained by whatever humanity tries to do with him. Nailed to the Cross, they thought they'd got him, but no, the stone was rolled back and He was not there.

And where was He? In the garden of course, meaning the world we know because that's how the Bible uses garden imagery. The gospel begins with the birth at Bethlehem, the Incarnation, combining the Divine and the human, and on resurrection morning the message is the same. Christ is in the midst of the world; our world. Easter faith, Easter joy, is not a foray into history, but a living experience which calls us to be an Easter people, people who accept that Jesus is out and about. Those who want a convenient Jesus, an affable Sunday morning Jesus find he's moved on. Christ says let's be the real church with the real me; let's work together.

I hope that you can find time in Lent to assess priorities and then that you feel able to look forward to Easter, striding forth in the strength of the risen Christ.

SOME FACTS ABOUT BOOKS

- 1. The largest book in the world is 16.4 feet by 26.44 feet. Over 50 people took part in the construction of the book which is entitled "This the Prophet Mohamed"; and is a compilation of stories highlighting the lifetime achievements of Islam's Prophet as well as the positive influence of Islam on the international and humanitarian scene. It weighs about 1500kg has 429 pages and resides in Dubai having been made in 2012.
- 2. The world record for the longest title belongs to Vityala Yethindra for his book "The Historical Development of the Heart from Its Formation From ..." In all, the title contains 3,777 words and over 26,000 characters! It was written in 2019.
- 3. The oldest operating bookshop is in Lisbon, Portugal. It is called Bertrand Chiado and was opened in 1732.
- 4. The longest novel is by Marcel Proust. It is the 13 volume 'A la recherché du temps perdu' (Remembrance of things past) published in 1912, it has 9,609,000 characters including spaces.
- 5. Abibliophobia is the fear of running out of reading material.
- 6. Theodore Roosevelt, the US President read at least one book every day.
- 7. The earliest novel. Depending on your definition of novel, some believe it to be The Tale of Genjii written in the 11th century. But if one defers to classic Greek and Latin then 'Chareas and Callirhoe' written by Chariton in the 1st Century AD is the oldest novel.
- 8. The longest written word consists of 189,819 letters. It is the full name of 'titin' which is a giant protein.
- 9. The longest sentence printed is 832 words in Les Miserables by Victor Hugo.
- 10. The world's best-selling book is The Holy Bible at about 6 billion copies. The second best-selling is 'Quotations from Chairman Mao Tse Tung' or The Little Red Book with about 900million copies. If you include a series, then third place goes to the Harry Potter series at 500 million copies.
- 11. When reading your eyes look in different directions. Each of your eyes look at a different letter 50% of the time.
- 12. The most expensive book is 'the Codex Leicester' which sold for \$30.8 million in 1994. It was Leonardo da Vinci's science diary.
- 13. The first ever story written was Gilgamesh in 2100 BC; it was written in cuneiform script.
- 14. The oldest library continuously working is Khizanat al Qaraw-iyyin in Fez, Morocco. Fatima al Fihriya, a woman founded it in the 9th Century AD.





Minutes of a meeting of Cublington Parish Council held on 9th January 2024 at Biggs Pavilion at 7.30pm

1. Apologies None

2. Minutes of last meeting

The minutes of the last meeting held on 14th November 2023 were discussed by the meeting and duly signed by the Chair.

3. Declaration of Interest None.

4. Reports

Cllr Bond informed the meeting the local community board has a new manager called Michelle Parker who will be contacting us. Streetlighting is not being funded by Bucks Council due to the payback period. Cllr Blamires explained there would be no funding from Central Government for the forthcoming budget, there will be shortened hours at Waste Centres, parking charges will increase, minor road repairs would be given low priority and there will be less money for community boards. There may be some funds for community boards from Thames Valley Police. Cllr Cooper told the meeting that Bucks Council will set its budget in February at Full Council. Government has restricted increases to 5%. Bucks Council will increase its budget by 4.99% made up of 2.99% increase in Council Tax and 2% in Adult Social Care. Local Councils are having to pick up the shortfall of National Government. Non statutory services will take the hit, but Bucks Council will try and raise revenue to cover the shortfalls. There will be substantial cuts in 2024/25 and 2025/26. All the councillors stressed this was a national problem. The Council's expenditure is £500m and the cuts will be 20% of which 60% will come from services. The Unitary exercise of reducing five councils to one has

saved money. The Amersham office is to be sold, South Bucks lease is terminating shortly and there is the tower block in Aylesbury to be sorted.

Sewage Pipes - agenda item 8.6.

Clerk had produced a summary of all contact with Thames Water, Environment Agency and Bucks Council since 2018. Blockages seem to happen every 18mths. Bucks Council Environmental Health have tried to help us but felt could not assist us anymore. Meeting felt this was a matter for Bucks Council. Cllrs Blamires has suggested we involve our local MP with the issue. Clerk to write to Councillors with background information to be forwarded to Greg Smith. It was suggested we get as many residents as possible to write to TW/MP or a petition that would strengthen our argument with TW. The Clerk was asked to draft an article for the Crier explaining the position. Bucks Councillors felt a lot of the local villages had similar issues to ours, and Cllr Cooper offered to bring this matter to the attention of the **Environment Scrutiny Committee.**

Caravan Park

The applicant had appealed to the High Court to have the decision overruled. Applicant was successful in his appeal and the Inspectorate now must reconsider its decision. This is a highly unusual situation.

No further representation required –it is a review of process and decision. No timescales given.

5.2 To review the accounting statements to 31st December 2023

There was a surplus of £4,235.92 for the period to

31st December 2023 with closing cash balances of £25,938.67. The forecast to 31st March 2024 is a deficit of £5,705.08 after replacement lighting estimated at £7,500. Estimated cash reserves were £15,997.67.

5.3 Precept calculation 2024/25

A forecast of income and expenditure for 2024/25 was presented to the meeting which showed a surplus of £1,150 after estimating an increase of £630 in the precept to £13,230. It was agreed the precept should increase by £630 to £13,230 (5% increase).

6. Orchard Ground/ North Field Report

Cllr Waters met two people from Slapton Memorial Hall to show them the facilities at OG, and to discuss potential grant applications for their hall. There was a planting day on 6th January with trees bought with the £2,400 grant from the Tree Council, and a community planting day arranged for 13th January. Electricity contract finishes in February.

6.1 New Charity, lease and New Lawyers

Contact has been made with individuals who had expressed an interest to be trustees of the new charity yet to be formed. An initial meeting to discuss the proposed new charity has been arranged.

7. Planning Permissions

7.1 23/03067/APP New Dairy Farm Stewkley Road , Cublington LU7 0LS

Erection of agricultural building with concrete apron. No objection but neutral comment to Planners that building appeared larger than required for the commercial operation, and an advance investment in the proposed venture would be advisable before planning granted.

Application for Certificate of lawfulness for existing use in order to confirm that eight residential plots, vehicle plot, work area, an amenity block and additional landscaping subject to conditions 2, 5 10 and 16 of



WOMEN ARTISTS

It is undeniably true to say that women artists have been overlooked throughout history. We largely know the reasons and they make uncompelling and uncomfortable reading – sexism, misogyny, and the dominance of men's power in the patriarchal societies in which many women lived. Women artists have had specific challenges too – the sheer technical knowhow required to create art means that historically artists would have to study for years. And these opportunities were frequently just not available to women.

Whether it's learning how to be a good draughtsman, how to draw the nude form from life, or even how to mix paints, these skills demanded some level of tuition – tuition that was denied to all but a few women, often those wealthy enough to support themselves, or those who had another artist in the family.

Even when an artist was able to gain a decent artistic education, often women artists were expected to concentrate on flower paintings or scenes of domestic life. 'Serious' subjects were again reserved for male artists to interpret.

There are thousands of women artists represented on Art UK – it is difficult to calculate a precise figure as there are many artists only recorded with initials or surname, plus there are thousands of works that are catalogued as "unknown artist" or "British School" or are similarly vague. However, it is estimated that there are around 8,000 women artists with works on Art UK represented by around 20,000 artworks. This compares to a total of 300,000 artworks by 50,000 artists.

He was recognised around the village as the White Horse in the field near the church and each Christmas he and Shatzar would be decorated with tinsel for their ride on Christmas Day. *Jane*

FAMOUS BUCKINGHAMSHIRE WOMEN

Mary Shelley

The gothic classic Frankenstein was written by Mary Shelley in her Marlow stomping ground of Albion House where she lived with her poet husband, Percy Shelley

Enid Blyton

Old Thatch near Bourne End was the residence of Enid Blyton from 1929 until she moved with her family to Green Hedges in Beaconsfield in 1938. A prolific writer of children books since the 1930s, she has sold more than 600 million copies. Her books continue to be popular despite their somewhat dated views, and have a perfect mix of adventure, magic and quintessential British-ness.

Florence Nightingale

Founder of modern nursing, Florence Nightingale stayed at Claydon House near Buckingham after the Crimean War. Florence's sister was married to Harry Verney of Claydon and she would visit and recuperate at this lovely country house, away from the horrors of war, no doubt enjoying the beautiful Buckinghamshire countryside. The house is now open to the public where you can learn more about Florence Nightingale.

Amy Johnson

Amy Johnson's house, Monks Staithe, is opposite Princes Risborough's Manor House. This pretty 17th Century half-timbered house has a supposed connection with nearby Notley Abbey (where Sir Lawrence Oliver and Vivien Leigh lived in the 1940s) and it was briefly occupied by the famous aviatrix of the 1930's.

The Codebreakers of Bletchley Park

Bound by oath to never speak about their work, many women at Bletchley Park made huge contributions to the intelligence effort. Betty Webb spent 4 years at the codebreaking centre and had various roles, including intercepting German police messages which revealed the beginning of the Holocaust. Joyce Aylard operated the Bombe machine designed by Alan Turing to crack the Enigma Code. The sad thing for these women and the others who worked there was that their families died without ever knowing what they achieved in the War.

Nancy Astor

Nancy Astor was the first seated female Member of Parliament, serving from 1919 to 1945. On marrying Lord Waldorf Astor, they were gifted the lavish Cliveden House and estate in Buckinghamshire by Lord Astor's father as a wedding gift.

Ellen White

As a Lioness playing football for England, Ellen White from Aylesbury has become one of the country's most influencial footballers, inspiring girls and boys alike. In the 2019 Football World Cup, she became England's all-time top scorer in the tournament's history, and was part of the side that went on to win the She Believes Cup

POETRY FACTS

- 1. The earliest forms of poetry predate written language. They were sung or recited to help people remember genealogy, laws, and oral history.
- 2. The word "poetry" is from the Greek term poiesis, which means "making."
- 3. Poetry is one of the oldest forms of communication, dating back to prehistoric times with hunting poetry in Africa and ancient Egypt.
- 4. The oldest surviving epic poem is the Epic of Gigamesh and dates from the 3rd millennium BC in Sumer (now Iraq).
- 5. The longest poem in the world is the Mahabharata. An Indian epic poem dating from the 4th century BC or earlier, the poem has about 1.8 million words
- 6. The skin of murderer George Cudmore was used to bind an 1852 edition of John Milton's Poetical Works.
- 7. The word "unfriend" first appeared in a 1275 medieval poem titled "Brut" by Layamon. Coincidentally, this is also the same poem in which the word "muggle" first appears.
- 8. Ben Jonson was named the first poet laureate of England in 1616. However, the title didn't become an official royal office until 1668 when John Dryden was appointed. A poet laureate is responsible for writing poems for national occasions.
- 9. Existing fragments of Aristotle's Poetics described the three genres of poetry: the epic, the comic, and the tragic. It also laid out the rules for developing each genre to its full potential.
- 10. Geoffrey Chaucer's name is derived from the French chausseur, meaning "shoemaker."
- 11. Known as the father of English literature, British author Geoffrey Chaucer (1343–1400) is also considered the father of poetry and the greatest English poet of the Middle Ages.
- 12. Geoffrey Chaucer was the first poet to be buried in Poets' Corner of Westminster Abbey
- 13. Poet George McDonald (1824–1905) wrote a two-word poem called "The Shortest and Sweetest of Songs." It reads "Come Home."
- 14. Metrophobia is the fear of poetry.
- 15. Metromania is the compulsion to write poetry.
- 16. The world's shortest poem is a one-letter poem by Aram Saroyan. It is simply a four-legged version of the letter "m"; The meaning of the poem is uncertain, though some scholars describe it as a "close-up of a letter being born."
- 17. William Shakespeare is the best-selling poet of all time. With over 4 billion book sales globally, his surviving works include approximately 40 plays, 150 sonnets, 2 long-story poems, and a few eulogies.
- 18. With over 113 publications, Lee Bennett Hopkins (1938–2019) is considered to be the most prolific poet of the modern era.
- 19. The oldest surviving love poem is on a 4,000-year-old clay tablet simply named "Istanbul #2461." The unknown poet wrote this poem for king Shu-Sin to recite to his bride during a virility ritual.

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
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
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
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


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
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
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
