This is a huge accolade for the residents of Cublington and a recognition of the many hours of volunteer work around the village to enhance our village. The Buckinghamshire Best Kept Village committee have scheduled the Motts Coach Tour of Winning Villages/Town for Saturday 20th September. Countess Elizabeth Howe (HM Lord Lieutenant) will be with their new Chairman (Carol Hayward) to present the Cup. There will be between 15-20 in the coach party (judges etc). They will be looking to arrive from the south of the County at approximately 1220pm and will need to move on around 1245pm so a "whistle stop". 



5.2 To consider the accounting statement to 30th June 2025 M Joy presented the accounts to 30th June 2025 and forecast of the year ending 31st March 2026. There was a deficit of £5,115 for the period to 30th June and a surplus is forecast to 31st March 2026 of £1,164 . The cash balance on 30th June was £16.238.

### 6. Orchard Ground/ North Field Report

30/6/25 PAYE - tax June

The fortnightly drinks evenings are well attended and now expanded into food fortnightly rather than every other fortnight.

Cricket club BBQ on Fridays are open to the village on Fridays when it is not a drinks night. North Field will be mowed shortly. The grant officer of Rothchilds Foundation came to the village and there is a possibility of grants from Green Community.

Rectory Home Grants were contacted concerning a £10,000 grant for the accessible path from OG to the playground. The path is estimated to cost £18,000 to £19,000.

Grants from Luton Airport expansion will be looked at. Tree Preservation Orders will be considered for the rare trees in North Field and surrounding areas.

### 6.1 New Charity and lease

The application for registration of the charity is still in progress due to the administrative issues of the Charities Commission.

The Memorandum of understanding agreement with Cublington Cricket Club was sent to NALC lawyers for their comment on the termination clauses. The advice was: The Memorandum provides that it can be ended in two circumstances. Firstly, by not less than 12 months written notice expiring on the date that it would otherwise be renewed. You could give notice now terminating the Agreement on the 31st of December 2026. If you waited until the 2nd of January 2026 to give notice, the end date would be the 31st of

December 2028. The notice does not have to be given for any reason. If there is a breach of the terms of the Agreement notice to terminate can be given. In our view the breach would have to be serious, and the length of the notice would depend upon the nature of the breach. The Club failing to exist or continue to operate would be a breach entitling a short notice period.

### 7. Planning Permissions

### 7.1 25/012588/APP Orchard Ground

**Playing Field Stewkley Road** – erection of a war memorial – no objection.

#### 8. Village Matters

### 8.1 Traffic - calming.

Speedwatch Continued activity . It was noted there were 350 movements in one hour when the A418 was closed. More volunteers are required.

Traffic Calming – Bucks Highways have been commissioned to produce a feasibility report – Clerk to chase. Cllr Shults showed a video of traffic calming 'buildout' in Hillingdon Borough. A buildout is a kerb extension which leaves a narrow gap for cars to navigate. A buildout was recommended to us in our 2019 traffic report. The cost in 2019 was £30,000 for one on the Wing Road and £30,000 for the High Street which would include vegetation clearance .As reported in previous minutes. Road bumps and chicane will be considered. The clerk had contacted Wooton a parish council which had installed variable speed cameras to determine the costs. The cost was £80,000 plus annual maintenance costs of £10,000. This cost was far more than our financial capabilities.

### 8.2 Granite sculpture

Cllr Reilly presented design drawings for the memorial together with samples of the granite. It was agreed Cllr Reilly would attend the next Orchard Ground committee meeting to show them the plans etc and to discuss an appropriate site for it. The Quartz Worktop Company will donate the designs and materials. There will installation costs , yet to be determined.

### 8.3 Appointment of Clerk

There had been no enquiries concerning the clerk's job which was published in the Crier. We shall advertise in the adjoining village newsletters and contact Bucks Association of local councils.

#### 8.4 Thames Water

The issue with the sewage pipes at Silver Street/Chapel Alley was raised with our local MP , Laura Kryke-Smith . She will assist us with the matter. The summary of all contact with TW over the past 8 years was forwarded to her and her assistant.

### 8.5 Missing Road Signs

Cllr Waters raised the point that there were some missing road signs. This matter had been raised with our local area technician on his last visit, and it was agreed a replacement sign would be located on the Wing Road, but we would wait until the traffic feasibility report had been completed before putting a sign on the Whitchurch Road. Since the meeting, the sign has been installed.

### 8.6 Hedges

A complaint had been received about how dangerous it was walking down parts of the High Street because of overgrown hedges which were infringing on the path and forcing pedestrians to walk into the road.

The parish council arranged for the hedges to be cut back.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will take place on Tuesday 16th September 2025 at 7.30pm at the Village Hall.

# British Army in the Pacific Theater During WW2: A Synopsis

Often overshadowed by the campaigns in Europe and North Africa, the British Army, alongside a vast multinational force from the Commonwealth, played a crucial and grueling role in the Pacific War. From the initial stunning defeats to a hard-won, decisive victory in Burma, the story of the British Army in the Far East is one of resilience, adaptation, and immense sacrifice.

#### Early Disasters: Malaya and Singapore

The entry of Japan into the Second World War in December 1941 was marked by a series of swift and devastating blows to the British Empire in the Far East. The Japanese invasion of Malaya on December 8, 1941, caught the British and Commonwealth forces, which included British, Indian, and Australian troops, ill-prepared for the rapid and effective jungle warfare tactics of the Imperial Japanese Army.[1][2] Inadequate air cover, a confused command structure, and an underestimation of the enemy's capabilities contributed to a disastrous 73-day campaign.[1] The retreat down the Malay Peninsula culminated in the fall of Singapore on February 15, 1942, an event Winston Churchill described as "the worst disaster and largest capitulation in British history."[1] Over 130,000 British, Indian, and Australian troops were taken as prisoners of war, facing brutal conditions in captivity.[1][3]

### The Long Road Back: The Burma Campaign

Fourteenth Army.[1][4]

Following the fall of Singapore, Burma (modern-day Myanmar) became the next target for the advancing Japanese forces. The initial British and Commonwealth forces, alongside their Chinese allies, were forced into a lengthy and arduous retreat of nearly 1,000 miles back to the Indian border.[1] This marked the beginning of the long and brutal Burma Campaign, a theater of war characterized by dense jungles, monsoonal rains, and rampant disease. The tide began to turn with the establishment of the South East Asia Command (SEAC) in November 1943, under the leadership of Admiral Lord Louis Mountbatten, and the appointment of Lieutenant General William Slim to command the newly formed

### The "Forgotten Army" and the Leadership of General Slim

The Fourteenth Army, often dubbed the "Forgotten Army" due to the lack of contemporary press coverage, was a truly multinational force. [5] At its peak, it numbered over a million men, the majority of whom were from the British Indian Army, alongside significant contingents of British, African, and other Commonwealth troops. [5][6] Under General Slim's pragmatic and inspiring leadership, the Fourteenth Army was transformed into a formidable fighting force. [5][7] Slim emphasized jungle warfare training, aggressive tactics, and, crucially, maintained the morale of his diverse troops. [5] A key element of the British strategy in Burma was the use of longrange penetration groups known as the Chindits. [8] Conceived



by Brigadier Orde Wingate, the Chindits conducted two major expeditions deep behind enemy lines in 1943 and 1944, disrupting Japanese supply lines and communications.[8] While the military effectiveness of the Chindits remains a subject of debate due to high casualties, their operations had a significant psychological impact and demonstrated the feasibility of sustained jungle operations.

### Decisive Victories and the Recapture of Burma

The turning point in the Burma Campaign came with the decisive battles of Imphal and Kohima in 1944. The Japanese launched a major offensive into India, which was repelled by the Fourteenth Army after months of brutal fighting.[7] This victory crippled the Japanese forces in Burma and paved the way for the Allied reconquest of the country.

In 1945, the Fourteenth Army launched a major offensive, driving the Japanese southwards.[5] Through a combination of conventional assaults, flanking maneuvers, and crucial air support for supplies, they crossed the Irrawaddy River and captured the key cities of Meiktila and Mandalay in March 1945.[7] Rangoon, the capital, was liberated in May 1945.[7] The successful Burma Campaign was a testament to the endurance of the soldiers and the brilliant generalship of Slim.[7]

#### Command and Control

The initial command structure in the Far East was the British Far East Command. Following early defeats, the short-lived American-British-Dutch-Australian (ABDA) Command was formed. For the majority of the Burma Campaign, land forces were under the command of SEAC, with the 11th Army Group (later redesignated Allied Land Forces South East Asia) overseeing the Fourteenth Army.

#### Naval and Air Support

While the land campaigns were central, the Royal Navy and Royal Air Force also played vital roles. The British Pacific Fleet, formed in 1944, was the largest and most powerful fleet in the history of the Royal Navy and participated in the final stages of the war against Japan, including the Battle of Okinawa.[8] Air power was critical for reconnaissance, close air support, and, most importantly, for supplying the troops fighting deep in the jungle, a tactic that was perfected during the Burma Campaign.

In conclusion, the British Army's contribution in the Pacific during World War II, as part of a wider Commonwealth and Allied effort, was pivotal in the eventual defeat of Japan. After suffering initial humiliating defeats, the army, under inspired leadership and with the unwavering support of a diverse multinational force, adapted to the harsh realities of jungle warfare and ultimately achieved a remarkable and hard-fought victory.

### North Field Update

North Field is very grateful to the Village Fete Committee for their generous donation of £700 towards the North Field project, this will be very helpful towards our fundraising for a storage container; we're also seeking funds to buy a rough cut petrol mower. The funding for North Field is by way of grant funding, occasional generous donations from village residents and from our "Friends of North Field" scheme where a few pounds a month is paid via a standing order. All of this funding to date has helped to provide the community orchard and the early planting for the community woodland. Other support has been by way of donations for the three seats which have been placed around North Field, and for trees to mark significant birthdays and in memory of loved ones who have passed away.

Our very best and on the going giving is from our team of dedicated volunteers who give of their time, energy and skills to help with the myriad of tasks on North Field throughout the year, as the seasons change and come round again. Volunteering is usually twice a month on a Saturday morning 9.30am until 12 noon. Volunteering is very flexible and we're aware that we all have competing calls on our time. For several of our volunteers, their volunteering is seasonal due to other commitments, for others their volunteering is carried out over an evening or on a morning. New volunteers will be made very welcome, please contact Martyn for a chat, contact details below.

These past summer months has been busy time on North Field, you may have heard that this summer is one of the driest on record. We've used a system of 'spot watering' directly around the base of the larger trees rather than blanket water areas of the field. The leaves on many trees have already changed into their autumn colours, some have grown small leaves. The apples, pears, apricots, damsons, and plums in the community orchard are quite small; but for the first time since the cider apple trees were planted in 2020, a number of the trees have apples, albeit very small; but it's a start! The seven Scots Pine trees planted in 2022 to mark the seven decades of the late HM Queen Elizabeth's reign and bearing fir cones for the first time. In 2020, 2021 and 2022, some 3,000 tree whips donated by Conservation Volunteers were planted out, its interesting to see now the patterns of these smaller trees and bushes some of which have thrived where the field has water closer to the surface. In 2021 and 2022 hedging whips were planted along the boundary fence by the cricket pitch, these have done amazingly well, even the hot summer weather

has not stunted their growth, the reason being that there is an old field drain that runs along the fence. One of the tasks for the early autumn will be to dig some holes around the field to map the water on North Field.

Summer tasks have also included cutting the docks and removing these from the field and cutting the dry grasses after Hugh had mown the field. Trees are regularly checked and the deer netting refastened where this has become loose. Deer or rabbits will eat the tree bark quickly killing the tree. Other taks include filling in holes where dogs or badgers have dug around the tree roots. We do see occasional evidence of badgers in North Field, but just this week nine holes were filled in around trees several of which were deep enough tp expose the tree roots. It's great that North Field is used by dog walkers, but if your dog is a 'digger,' please kick the earth back into the hole they've just dug out.

As the next planting autumn season approaches, we have some 50 small tree around 1.0m - 1.5m tall in the nursery area which can soon be planted out into the main field. We're in contact with the Tree Council about grant funding for several tree saplings of Black Poplar trees. As highlighted in a previous edition of the Crier, we have one very old Black Poplar tree in our boundary hedge near to the bench that David and Freddie donated to North Field. We have six oak trees from Wingrave school who gave each pupil in the school an oak tree sapling to celebrate the school's 50th anniversary. Several children in Cublington and Aston Abbotts have asked if their trees can be planted on North Field in a 'Wingrave School Oak Tree area.'

# New committee members & volunteers always wanted.

Please volunteer to help on this committee if you can spare the odd hour or two every month.



I'm delighted to write for the latest issue of the Cublington Crier. This July marks one year since I was elected to serve as your Member of Parliament.

You may or may not have voted for me, but I aim to represent you all. I promised to be an accessible and active MP, and I've been out and about across the villages that are part of the constituency, meeting residents and supporting local organisations.

Most recently, I really enjoyed going along to the Chatty Cafe in Cublington. As you'd expect, we had some great chats! We spoke about the huge increase in traffic affecting the village at the moment and I've promised to take this up with Buckinghamshire Council, to see what traffic calming measures or diversions could be considered.

We talked about the challenges that our farmers are facing, including the concerns about inheritance tax changes and the future of the Government's financial support for farming.



I was really pleased to chat to Martyn Waters and others about their work to save the village pub, The Unicorn. I know how important pubs are to our village communities and I told them that they have my full support.

It was also lovely to hear such kind words about my colleague Eris Robertson and Alison Morris, who stood to be Councillors for the Bierton, Kingsbrook & Wing ward in May.

The issues raised by Cublington residents help inform my work in Parliament, where I've spoken more than 100 times in the last year to raise the issues that matter to you.

Improving the road networks and potholes, for example. Potholes have plagued motorists in Buckinghamshire for too long, damaging cars and making drivers, pedestrians and cyclists less safe. I have raised the issue of potholes in Parliament and I welcome the Government's commitment to delivering more than £20 million in funding to Buckinghamshire Council to fix those potholes.

Alongside being out and about in the constituency and in Parliament, the bread-and-butter work of an MP is answering correspondence from residents and helping them solve issues they're having. Since being elected, I have set up my small and dedicated team from scratch. They help me to reply to the large volume of letters and emails that come my way. We have processed over 7000 enquiries since the election, and I have corresponded with constituents on a wide range of subjects from animal welfare to potholes, HS2 to fly tipping. We have also held five village "Meet and Greet" events so far in Ivinghoe, Edlesborough, Cheddington, Wing and Bierton, and a "Meet Your MP" village hall event in Slapton, which provide an informal opportunity to meet with me and discuss issues both local and national.

These are just some of the things I've prioritised in year one. I am always open to feedback and ideas. Let me know what you'd like me to focus on in year two.

#### Dear All.

I wanted to provide you an update on the actions that came out of Laura's recent visit to the Chatty Café in Cublington and to thank you for hosting us.

On the issue of Thames Water, as Laura's caseworker I have raised this directly with Thames Water and they have requested direct contact to discuss the issues. I have spoken to Mike Joy and provided contact details for him to speak to Thames Water directly on his return from holiday.

Regarding the closures and staff shortages at 3W Health (Wing Surgery), we have written directly to the Surgery and Laura is visiting them to discuss these concerns in August – we will provide a further update after this meeting.

In terms of the concerns of the issues raised around speeding and enforcement again I have written on Laura's behalf to both Buckinghamshire Council and Thames Valley Police and I am currently awaiting a response on these. Again, as soon as we receive a response we will provide you with an update.

### Cublington's Fight to Save The Unicorn Pub Reaches Parliament

Cublington, Buckinghamshire, 28 th July 2025. The community-led campaign to save Cublington's beloved village pub, The Unicorn, has won national recognition – with a mention in the House of Commons this month, probably the first pub to be addressed in the proposed right to buy legislation.

The currently closed pub, which has stood at the heart of village life for generations, is the subject of a determined local effort to bring it into community ownership. The campaign, driven by residents of Cublington and surrounding areas, received a major boost on



Thursday 17 th July when it was raised in Parliament by local MP Laura Kyrke-Smith, highlighting the vital role pubs like The Unicorn play in rural life.

"This isn't just about saving a pub," said a spokesperson for the Save The Unicorn campaign. "It's about preserving a vital part of our heritage and community, a place where neighbours gather, stories are shared, and the spirit of the village comes alive. We're proud that our campaign has now been recognised in Parliament – it shows the strength of what we're building together."

This isn't the first time Cublington has come together to fight for its future. In the 1970s, the village famously resisted plans to become the site of London's third airport, a victory that earned it the nickname "the village that roared." That same spirit of community determination is alive and well today. The Save The Unicorn team has already secured over £430,000 in pledges from local residents towards the pub's asking price. A formal Red Book valuation, an independent assessment required as part of the community right to buy process, is due to be released shortly. This will help clarify the final amount the village will need to raise should the opportunity to exercise the right to buy be confirmed. With the valuation in place, a formal offer will be submitted along with a business plan that would see the pub reopen with a community-first approach, potentially including food, events, and even local produce retail.

Supporters are urging locals and former residents alike to get involved, whether by pledging support, spreading the word, or joining the campaign's growing volunteer group.

"This is a rare chance to protect a vital part of our heritage," the campaign team added. "With enough support, we can restore The Unicorn as a thriving, community-run pub that serves not just drinks, but people."

The working group would like to thank all the village groups, companies and individuals who made donations to the Save the Pub campaign which provided much needed funds for the Red Book Valuation report, initial and ongoing costs.

In June, the working group requested a Red Book Valuation and Report for a community purchase of the Unicorn. A Red Book valuation, is a completely independent valuation which follows a prescribed process and is carried out by a certified member of The Royal Institute of Chartered Surveyors (RICS), and as such is more authentic than one carried out by an estate agent.

The RICS is therefore considered to be the foremost authority and most respected as a measure of true value within the licensed trade.

Following the Red Book Valuation Report, the Friends of the Unicorn, Cublington working group made an offer to purchase the pub for £357,500, subject to a full structural survey being undertaken.

The offer was made taking into consideration that the Unicorn has been closed since the end of August 2024, with a 10% consideration for the current fixtures and fittings. The offer was rejected.

At the time the survey was undertaken, no information was available as to trading or income figures for the pub. The vendor subsequently sent the surveyor copies of historical trading figures for the Unicorn Public House, which were deemed to be too old (pre covid) to be relevant and more recent figures for The Sandridge Pub Company (Unicorn) Ltd.

None of these accounts had been audited.

# **Executive Summary of the Red Book Valuation Report:**

The surveyors were instructed to prepare a valuation of the public house based upon an appraisal of the property and potential for sustainable business for a community group who would operate the property as a public house and a community hub. The report does not include a structural survey.

# The valuation report puts forward three market valuations for the Unicorn:

- £445,000 if the Unicorn is fully operational, is fully equipped and trading;
- £380,000 not operational but fully equipped with recent trading records:
- £325,000 not operational, lack of information as to past income, trading figures etc.; effectively an empty property;

### Other points in the report included the following:

- The Unicorn pub in Cublington is currently on the market for £675,000 plus VAT;
- No information about a premises license has been found on the Bucks Council website. Retaining or obtaining a licence should be a condition of sale;
- The property is registered with Buckinghamshire County Council as an asset of community value; this expires in June 2026;
- The property closed at the end of August 2024. At tested to ensure they are suitable and safe for use.
- The 2-bed accommodation will require refurbishment to bring it up to the standard which will attract the right tenant.
- The cost of the clearance of the accommodation may cost several thousands of pounds: carpets, furniture, kitchen equipment etc.;
- The Business Ratable Value (2023) was £16,750, the previous ratable value for the period April 2017 March 2023 was £27,250.
- The Council Tax banding for the 2-bed residential accommodation is A.

Members of the working group have made contact with a number of community owned pubs within a 15 mile radius of Cublington to ask questions about their efforts to save their village pubs for their communities. We were advised to make contact with Plunkett's Foundation, a charity who work to help save village pubs, shops and post offices. We have joined Plunkett's and have benefitted from their advice and information including three on-line discussions with our designated adviser. The Red Book Report and Valuation was carried out on the advice of Plunkett's at a cost of £2,000 rather than the commercial rate of £4,000.

Prior to our offer of £357,500 we notified Buckinghamshire Council of our intention to make an offer on behalf of our local community to buy the Unicorn pub for the village. They have amended the information they hold about the pub, noting that it has been closed since August 2024.

Our next tasks will be to agree a business model to be used for the purchase of the Unicorn Pub for the village and to draw up a business plan. Whilst we currently have pledges of £431,750, we will continue to raise funds/ pledges for the purchase of the pub, including associated costs for example, stamp duty, legal fees, surveys and professional services. In addition to an agreed purchase price, additional funds will be needed to refurbish the 2-bed accommodation, for equipment checks and servicing, to restock and to provide a cushion of funds for the community pub.

Our local MP recently raised questions in Parliament about our efforts here in Cublington to buy the pub for the village. Proposed new legislation is progressing through Parliament to provide community organisations with a right to buy community assets. It is hoped that this proposed legislation will be added to the statute book early in 2026. In such instances, the local authority request an independent valuation and become the arbiter between a vendor and the local community for the purchase of a community asset.

Members of the working group consider that we are now in a waiting game with the vendor of the Unicorn.
