

#### North Field Update

The new planting season has started with the planting of six black poplar trees, a mix of male and female trees which were bought from the grant monies from the village fete which was held in June this year. Five black poplars have been planted in a nursery block; the other one has been planted down near the male poplar tree in the hedge line; can you find where it is? Other trees will be planted in November, either moved from the tree nursery area next to the allotments, or trees which have been donated and being looked after until the planting season. It would be great to have some help with the planting. Other tasks completed over the past few weeks include planting bluebells, trimming around the bases of birch trees, and repairing and refixing the deer netting which is a bit like 'painting the Forth Road Bridge,' as it's a never ending task. The deer are present hazard in North Field and will eat the bark off the larger trees, and branches of the small trees. We're graceful to Hugh for doing the last cut of field as we approach the winter. It anyone in the village has any bluebells they are digging out this autumn, we'll be pleased to have them for North Field, as now is an ideal time to plant them.

#### Sprocket's Rural Rides

The first in a (possible) occasional series of local outings for devotees of two-wheeled velocipedes

One of the consequences of having lived in our current home for a longer period than either of us has spent in any previous abode is that we have accumulated a lot of clutter. In the course of a long overdue clearing out of the garden shed, I set sight, with a pang of guilt, on my Bianchi Camaleonte bike, purchased in a moment of excessive enthusiasm fully 12 years ago but used all too rarely. I resolved to do better. The words of Queen's song 'Bicycle Race' came to mind:


"I want to ride my bicycle
I want to ride my bike
I want to ride my bicycle
I want to ride it where I like" \*

After a quick trip to Dorvics' store in Leighton Buzzard and an application of oil, the bike was ready for action. The question remained – where to go? My hope was to find a "go-to" round trip which could serve as a regular outing for my latest attempt at a fitness regime. It should ideally be reasonably quiet, not too long and without too many hills. Surely there would be some idyllic lanes nearby along which I could gently cruise, my senses stimulated by the floral scents of an English hedgerow, enjoying the vistas of wheatsheaves in golden fields?

The reality was more sobering. The sevenfold increase in traffic along the Wing Road, and the idiocy of some of the drivers one encounters there, immediately disqualified it from consideration.

The A413 between Whitchurch and Winslow was even worse, the traffic seeming to snarl as it careered past a lone cyclist minding his own business and who had every right to be there. After trying out various options, none of which could really be considered as rural idylls, I eventually settled on the following

outing:



This is a circular route which is pretty good in either direction. Anticlockwise is perhaps better as it avoids an awkward right turn to Swanbourne after the (very short) section on the A413. Otherwise the volume, and for that matter the speed, of traffic is not too bad, especially in the middle of the day or at weekends. There are several hilly sections but they are not particularly steep or sustained.

The recently resurfaced Stewkley road makes for a pleasant start as far as the junction with the road from Littlecote. Here

one needs to be prepared for an encounter with one of the many tipper trucks servicing the Doherty recycling business, although in my experience their drivers seem to be respectful of passing cyclists. At St Michael's church in Stewkley, follow the road round towards Soulbury. Roughly half a mile before reaching Soulbury, turn left along a single track road which takes one through the hamlet of Hollingdon, then through a very pleasant section with fields on either side leading to a hill up to a junction. This is one of the best bits of the ride where one can genuinely feel in the midst of the countryside. Turn left at the junction and soon arrive at the northern end of Stewkley, where one turns right towards Mursley. On the whole the traffic on this section isn't heavy and after a mile and half with pleasant views on both sides turn left towards Swanbourne. The road here is generally flat and of course the Betsey Wynne pub is available for well earned refreshments at roughly the half way point of the ride.

After an easy descent past Swanbourne House School there is a gradual climb up to the junction with the horrible A413 where one turns left. After a mercifully short section of 500 metres or so turn (with a sigh of relief) on to the road signposted to Hoggeston. What a gem this little village is with its old church dating back to the 13 th century and the splendid manor house which now seems to be part of a farm with its own shop selling pork, beef and lamb on Fridays and Saturday mornings.

A gradual climb takes one up to a junction near Dunton .The camber here is more or less non-existent and any failure to keep an eye on the edge of the road could easily lead to an undignified tumble into a bed of nettles. At the junction one turns left , following the road past Littlecote and down a hill as far as the junction where one rejoins the outward route, noting with relief that it is but a mile and half back to the comforts of Cublington.

The obvious short cut up (or down) Cowsh\*t Lane is probably best avoided despite the recent patching up of the road surface. From a cyclist's perspective, it might be good training for the Pyrenean sections of the Tour de France but is otherwise for masochists only.

#### Sprocket's overall verdict: 7/10

Not quite the rural idyll but much of the going is pleasant and displays the essential character of this part of the world. Moderately strenuous at times – you will at least know you have done it!



#### Tips of the week... how to help the hedgehogs

- Join a "hedgehog highway". By linking your garden with others via 13cm gaps in fences, you can give hedgehogs easy access to a far larger area.
- Leave a patch of your garden wild and undisturbed to provide good nesting material and insects for prey
- Leave out a dish of water. Some meaty cat or dog food can also supplement a hedgehog's natural diet well.
- Hedgehogs can get trapped in steepsided ponds, so make sure yours has shallow sides or an escape ramp.
- Make a safe home for them to nest in –
- a log pile or a more structured little house. Clear litter from your garden and any
- loose netting they could get trapped in. Go organic: chemicals in lawn treatments
- or slug pellets kill invertebrate prey.
- Check tucked away areas before mowing. If you're having a bonfire, burn it on the



#### **VILLAGE HALLS... DID YOU KNOW?**

It has been estimated that there are some 10,000 village halls in the UK. It has also been estimated that UK contains some 6,000 villages. Just how these two estimates are to be reconciled with each other is unclear. If the purpose of a village hall is to serve as a meeting place for the local population and host a range of community-based events then some villages appear to be doubly blessed, if not actually a bit greedy.

Despite having a small population of around 330, Cublington may be one such village in that it has two buildings providing essential services, in the form of the Biggs Pavilion and the 'official' Village Hall on the Wing Road. The two institutions are separate but to a large extent complement each other. The purpose of this article is to draw attention to the wide range of activities carried on at the Village Hall following its recent 'renaissance'; it is not intended in any way to steal the thunder of the excellent Biggs Pavilion where many important events continue to take place and which we wholeheartedly support.

The building which now serves as the Village Hall was founded in 1872 as a National (Mixed) School for 60 children on land donated by the Biggs family and was governed by the Diocese of Oxford. Attendances seem to have averaged around 40 for much of the School's life. However early in the 20th century this number declined to around 15, leading to the eventual closure of the school in 1922. Anyone seeking more detail of this period in the building's history is directed to the County Record Office in Aylesbury where a two-volume Log Book has been preserved.

For most of the last century the building has operated as a conventional village hall apart from a recent period of use as a nursery for young children.

Most notably, the Hall has hosted the traditional Cublington panto each year. As such the building has borne witness to dramatic performances of such searing intensity that one wonders whether, as with many of London's great theatres, the lingering emotional energy might lead to eerie visitations by the unhappy spirits of Cublington's

finest thespians of bygone days. Perhaps fortunately, there is not a single scrap of evidence that would support this notion; any 'bumping' sounds that concerned pedestrians might hear as they pass by on dark nights are more likely attributable to Gwyneira Waters, the tireless Chair of the present Hall committee, wrestling with an awkward vacuum attachment in her quest to keep the Hall sparklingly clean or rearranging the furniture for the following day's activities.

The list of village groups availing themselves of the facilties of the Hall, following its substantial redecoration and updating over the past two years, continues to grow. Regular users include an Art group, a Chess club, a Book club, Tai Chi and Yoga groups and a local band. There is a monthly 'byte and brew' session, designed to help villagers to experience more fully the joys of information technology. The main regular social occasion is perhaps 'Wine Down evening' (bring your own booze, mingle a little and achieve a happy state in which you temporarily forget about the continuing closure of the Unicorn) but this year has also seen two elegant cream teas (worthy of the Ritz but at a fraction of the price), several 'Ladies' Lunches', events celebrating the 80th anniversaries of both VE Day and VJ Day and various evenings dedicated to the consumption of fish and chips or curry. Another *Christmas Fair* is scheduled for the end of this month. There surely cannot have been a time in the history of the Hall in which the interior has looked better or in which it has hosted a wider range of activities for the benefit of the local community. The courtyard at the rear of the building has also been tidied up – the rotten fencing around the oil tank has been replaced, there are several smart new wrought iron tables and chairs and flowers have been planted in what was a bed of weeds. All this is testament to the energy and vision of Gwyneira and her band of enthusiastic helpers whom I will not embarrass by naming – but they, like many of the Crier's readers, know who they are!

When one factors in the many activities carried on at the Biggs Pavilion, Cublington can certainly consider itself 'doubly blessed'.

#### 2. Minutes of last meeting

The minutes of the last meeting held on 8th July 2025 were discussed by the meeting and duly signed by the Chair.

#### 3. Declaration of Interest

#### 4. Reports

Buckinghamshire Council will be publishing its Local Plan for consultation.

A discussion took place about the quality of the recent work conducted on Dunton Road. It was asked when the failed road on the Wing Road will be repaired. The Unitary Councillors to clarify the approach to how potholes are repaired as it was felt the current approach appears to duplicate work and is inefficient.

A query was raised as to how many pitches were required for gypsy and traveller sites in Buckinghamshire.

It had been discovered there was an application for a Environment permit to operate Biomass boiler at Wing Complex (this is alongside the chicken farm) to burn poultry manure and wood waste. The clerk had been in contact with Wing PC who were objecting to the permit. We had not been notified of the application nor invited to make any comments. Details of the application are on the Buckinghamshire Council website. Clerk to submit an objection.

Planning Applications can now be 'called in' by Parish Councils.

The new regional community board has its first meeting Thursday 18th September at Bierton village hall.

The charity is being set up to ease grant applications and to be a vehicle to receive the Orchard Ground/ North Field asset should the parish council cease to exist. The draft lease between the parish council and the charity is ready to be signed once the Charity is formed. A memorandum of understanding should be prepared for the tennis club to reflect the MU with the cricket club.

#### 8.4 Thames Water

The pipes have been inspected and cleaned. A full survey has been conducted which showed no defects. This matter was first raised in February and finalised on 28th August. Clerk still trying to pursue a maintenance programme with TW.

#### 8.5 Best Kept Village

Cublington has won the Gurney Cup, and the presentation will be held on Saturday 20th September at the Village Hall. Our previous Unitary Councillors have been invited to the presentation to thank them for all the support they have given us.

#### 8.6 Village Fete Donation

The Village Fete Committee has kindly donated £300 to the Parish Council – the money has been put towards the new waste bins.

The next meeting of the ParishCouncil will take place on Tuesday 11th November 2025 at 7.30pm at the Village Hall.

## SLOE GIN COMPETITION DETAILS including categories and date COMING NEXT MONTH

# SLOE Gin RECIPE - this is so simple!

500g ripe sloes (Right now they're perfect!) 250g golden caster sugar 1 litre gin

#### Step 1

Rinse and pick over the sloes, then pat dry in a clean tea towel. *Either* Using a stainless steel fork or cocktail stick, prick the sloes and tip into a 2-litre glass jar, or divide between two smaller jars. *Alternatively* freeze on a tray after washing, this negates the need to prick each berry. Then place in hars as above.

#### Step 2

Add the sugar and gin, then seal the jar. Shake well. Once a day for seven days, give the jar a good shake. Store the jar in a cool, dark place and leave for two to three months.

#### Step 3

Line a plastic sieve with a square of muslin set over a bowl and strain the sloe gin through it. Decant into clean, dry bottles, then seal and label. The sloe gin is now ready to drink but it'll improve and mature over time – so, if possible, make it one year to drink the next.





### From the Rector





#### The Festival of Christ the King

"When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, he will sit on his glorious throne. All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate the people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. He will put the sheep on his right and the goats on his left. Matthew 25:31-33

This is the ominous start to a passage in the bible known as the 'Parable of the sheep and the goats' which was told by Jesus and sometimes read on the last Sunday of November before Advent when we start to prepare for Christmas.

Most of the festivals we celebrate in church throughout the year are very ancient. From the earliest days Christians would have remembered the events of Good Friday and Easter around the time of the Jewish Passover every year. And if you listen to podcasts I would recommend "Christmas: Pagan or Christian" from The Rest is History series with Tom Holland and Dominic Sandbrook. Their conclusions might surprise you! But one major Christian festival that is only 100 years old will happen on Sunday 23 rd November this year. This is the Feast of Christ the King. It is observed by many Christian denominations including Catholics, Methodists, Presbyterians, Lutherans and Anglicans but it was only started in 1925 by Pope Pius XI. Some pictures and icons of Jesus as King can feel a bit intimidating a domineering. But this festival is actually a warning to the powers of domination and control.

Three years after Mussolini's fascist government took the reigns of power in Italy and a year after Stalin consolidated his grip over the Soviet Union, the Feast of Christ the King was, in part, an answer to the rise of authoritarian and ultranationalist political leaders. Despite the apocalyptic language of the parable of the sheep and the goats we find out that what the returned King, Jesus, is interested in is showing love and care to those most in need. King Jesus reminds us to love our neighbours as ourselves. One hundred years on in an age of increasingly febrile politics, at home and abroad, the festival of Christ the King seems as relevant as ever. The parable continues...

"Then the King will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.' Matthew 25:34-36
